What is CFCC?

The CFCC was formed in 1998 and is made up of six funding members: four state, two federal. CFCC members facilitate and expedite the completion of various types of infrastructure projects helping customers combine the resources of different agencies. Project information is shared between members so additional resources can be identified. CFCC members conduct free funding fairs statewide each year to educate the public and potential customers about the different member agencies and the financial and technical resources available.

Purpose of CFCC Funding Fairs

CFCC Funding Fairs provide opportunities to obtain information about currently available infrastructure grant, loan and bond financing programs and options. Each attendee receives a copy of all slide presentations and additional infrastructure financing material. Funding Fairs also provide an opportunity for attendees to speak directly with program staff about specific projects and issues affecting their community.

Who should attend?

Representatives from public works, local governments, and California Native American Tribes. This includes city managers and planners, economic development and engineering professionals, officials from privately owned facilities, water and irrigation district managers, financial advisors and project consultants.

CFCC agencies fund primarily the following types of infrastructure projects:

- Drinking water
- Wastewater
- Water quality
- Water supply
- Water conservation
- Water use efficiency
- Energy efficiency
- Flood management

Some of the participating agencies also fund other types of infrastructure projects including streets and highways, emergency response vehicles, solid waste, and community facilities.

The six CFCC member agencies will provide presentations in the morning. CFCC member agencies and the following additional funding agencies will be available to discuss your projects throughout the day:

Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA): The BIA is responsible for providing coordination, management, planning, oversight, and monitoring for all activities related to development and protection of water resources. The BIA exercises program oversight and provides planning and scheduling of Bureau-wide water resource management activities to ensure that regulatory and policy requirements are followed and that technical standards of sound water resource management are upheld. The BIA as fiduciaries for Indian's and their water assets partners with federal, state, local and private partners to develop Tribal water resource management capacities, protect and improve water resources.

California Conservation Corps (CCC): The CCC is a state agency that works with young adults on natural resource conservation projects with a public benefit. The CCC will provide no cost labor to schools, public agencies, and commercial property owners for water-efficient landscaping and irrigation projects, the replacement and installation of water-efficient plumbing fixtures, and water efficiency education and outreach activities.

California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (Cal Recycle): CalRecycle offers funding opportunities authorized by legislation to assist public and private entities in the safe and effective management of the waste stream with two loan programs. Recycling Market Development Zone (RMDZ) Loans provide direct loans to businesses that use postconsumer or secondary waste materials to manufacture new products, or that undertake projects to reduce the waste resulting from the manufacture of a product. Greenhouse Gas Reduction Loans to promote in-state development of infrastructure to process California-generated organics and other recyclable materials into new value-added products.

California Energy Commission: The California Energy Commission is the state's primary energy policy and planning agency. The Energy Commission currently is administering two water saving programs.

- The Water Appliance Program provides rebates for energy and water efficient clothes washers and a direct install phase of various water and energy saving measures for disadvantaged communities. For more information:

- The Water Energy Technology Program provides rebates and grants for innovative technologies for businesses, residents, industries and agriculture that that will reduce greenhouse house gas emissions, water and energy use. For more information: <http://www.energy.ca.gov/wet/>

California Rural Water Association (CRWA): To meet the needs of member water and wastewater systems by providing quality information, training and technical assistance and legislative representation, and assist them in maintaining a high standard of service to their communities. <http://calruralwater.org>

Indian Health Service (IHS): The IHS Sanitation Facilities Construction Program provides technical and financial assistance to California Indian Tribes for the development and continuing operation of safe water and wastewater disposal facilities for Indian communities and residences. Natural Resources Agency: The California Natural Resources Agency awards competitive grants to projects for the protection and restoration of the state's natural, historical, and cultural resources. Current programs include the Environmental Enhancement and Mitigation Program to mitigate the environmental effects of transportation facilities, the Museum Grant Program to assist and enhance services provided by California's museums, other groups and institutions, and the California Urban Rivers Program to enhance multi-benefit watersheds and urban rivers within urban watersheds that increase regional and local water self-sufficiency.

Rural Community Assistance Corporation (RCAC): RCAC's Loan Fund is a financial resource for rural communities. We fill financing gaps and serve those traditionally neglected by conventional markets. We build local community capacity through training and technical assistance and our established network to access resources. <http://www.rcac.org/home>

Strategic Growth Council (SGC): The SGC's Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program will award approximately \$400 million of California Climate Investments funding to land-use, housing, transportation, and land preservation projects that advance the state's infill and compact development goals while reducing greenhouse gas ("GHG") emissions. Projects support affordable housing development, active transportation, complete streets, and related infrastructure improvements, and must institute GHG reductions by improving mobility options and increasing infill development, resulting in decreased vehicle miles traveled; or by protecting working lands from converting to urban sprawl, which would result in increased greenhouse gas emissions.
