What is CFCC?

The California Financing Coordinating Committee (CFCC) was formed in 1998 and is made up of seven funding members: five state, two federal. CFCC members facilitate and expedite the completion of various types of infrastructure projects helping customers combine the resources of different agencies. Project information is shared between members so additional resources can be identified. CFCC members conduct free funding fairs statewide each year to educate the public and potential customers about the different member agencies and the financial and technical resources available.

Purpose of CFCC Funding Fairs

CFCC Funding Fairs provide opportunities to obtain information about currently available infrastructure grant, loan and bond financing programs and options. Each attendee receives a copy of all slide presentations and additional useful infrastructure financing material. Funding Fairs also provide an opportunity for attendees to speak directly with program staff about specific projects and issues affecting their community.

Who should attend?

Representatives from public works, local governments and tribes. This includes city managers and planners, economic development and engineering professionals, officials from privately owned facilities, water and irrigation district managers, financial advisors and project consultants.

CFCC agencies fund primarily the following types of infrastructure projects:

- Drinking water
- Wastewater
- Water quality
- Water supply
- Water Recycling
- Water conservation
- Water use efficiency
- Energy efficiency
- Flood management
- Clean or renewable energy

Some of the participating agencies also fund other types of infrastructure projects including streets and highways, emergency response vehicles, solid waste, and community facilities.

The six CFCC member agencies will provide presentations in the morning. CFCC member agencies and the following additional funding agencies will be available to discuss your projects throughout the day:

Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA): The BIA is responsible for providing coordination, management, planning, oversight, and monitoring for all activities related to development and protection of water resources. The BIA exercises program oversight and provides planning and scheduling of Bureau-wide water resource management activities to ensure that regulatory and policy requirements are followed and that technical standards of sound water resource management are upheld. The BIA as fiduciaries for Indian's and their water assets partners with federal, state, local and private partners to develop Tribal water resource management capacities, protect and improve water resources.

California Conservation Corps (CCC): The CCC, a state department established in 1976 to provide young people with work and life skills training, engages its corpsmembers (men and women 18-25, and veterans to 29) in natural resource conservation works and education programs throughout the State of California. The CCC works with federal, state, local and nonprofit agencies on projects that provide a public good.

California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES)/Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA): FEMA Hazard Mitigation Assistance Branch administers three programs that provide funding for eligible mitigation projects that reduces disaster losses and protect life and property from future disaster damages: (1) Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) assists in implementing long-term hazard mitigation measures following a Presidential major disaster declaration; (2) Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) Program provides funds for hazard mitigation planning and projects on an annual basis; and (3) Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) Program provides funds for projects to reduce or eliminate risk of flood damage to buildings that are insured under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) on an annual basis

California Rural Water Association (CRWA): To meet the needs of member water and wastewater systems by providing quality information, training and technical assistance and legislative representation, and assist them in maintaining a high standard of service to their communities. <http://calruralwater.org>

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA): EPA will provide information about agency funding and other resources to support water- and energy efficiency, renewable energy, and water recycling projects. EPA will also share information about our WaterSense program, a free partnership program that seeks to protect the future of our nation's water supply by offering people a simple way to use less water with water-efficient products, new homes, and services. Program partners gain exclusive access to outreach and marketing resources to promote WaterSense and water efficiency. <https://www3.epa.gov/watersense/>

Indian Health Service (IHS): The IHS Sanitation Facilities Construction Program provides technical and financial assistance to California Indian Tribes for the development and continuing operation of safe water and wastewater disposal facilities for Indian communities and residences. Rural Community Assistance Corporation (RCAC): RCAC's Loan Fund is a financial resource for rural communities. We fill financing gaps and serve those traditionally neglected by conventional markets. Strategic Growth Council (SGC): In 2016, SGC's [Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program](#) will award approximately \$400 million of the California Climate Investments to land-use, housing, transportation, and land preservation projects that support infill and compact development, improve mobility options and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Awarded projects will build affordable housing, active transportation infrastructure, complete streets, and related infrastructure improvements that decrease vehicle miles traveled; or protect working lands from converting to urban sprawl, resulting in a reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. development, resulting in decreased vehicle miles traveled; or by protecting working lands from converting to urban sprawl, which would result in increased greenhouse gas emissions.
